We look forward to seeing you, a fun day out for all the family and of course your four legged friends!


#### In other news

# Life after rescue — "Carla (was Nala)"

This month we catch up with Debra and the very beautiful velco Dobie 'Carla'

#### **Finding Carla**

We lost our Manchester Terrier a few months before and Harry had always wanted to have a Dobermann. After having our Manchester Terrier from a puppy until he passed at 12.5 years old, I was not looking forward to having another puppy.

We discussed giving a rescue Dobermann a home and found DRUE on facebook. We noticed Carla (Nala) online. she had a kind loving face and we wanted to find out more about her.



After passing the home check we were invited to meet her. We drove 2 hours from Northamptonshire to meet her and brought her home the same day.

#### Arriving home

When we arrived home, she was so scared that she would not come into the house. We had to leave her in the back garden until she felt happy and safe to come in on her own accord.

The first few weeks were a huge learning curve for both us and Carla. When walking, she would snap at other dogs and we could not allow her off the lead.

#### **Great progress**

Gradually, after a few months of taking her everywhere we went, allowing her to meet other people and dogs and continually working on her recall, she turned a corner.

Now she loves her walks, playing with other dogs and her ball.





We holiday in a caravan and we were apprehensive that she would not enjoy it, but she has taken to it like a duck to water. Loving the walks, exploring new places and meeting new people.

What a wonderful Dobie we have rescued !

# Help us to improve the lives of more Dobies with gift aid

**Gift Aid** 

Help us to improve the lives of more Dobies with gift aid, it's simple and it costs you nothing.

At DRUE we are always looking to make the most of the donations we receive from our supporters so we can help as many needy Dobies as possible.

It might come as a surprise to you to hear that with your help the taxman will lend us a hand. He will do this using a device known as "gift aid".

If you pay income tax and you make a donation to DRUE, gift aid can increase the amount of money DRUE receives without any additional cost to you. Gift aid is really easy to use, so if you want to give even more help to Dobies, read on.



You must remember that you can only use gift aid if you pay United Kingdom income tax. It doesn't matter whether you pay your tax at the basic rate or at a higher rate, as long as tax is paid on your wages, salary, pension or other income.

In order to use gift aid all you have to do is to complete a Gift Aid Declaration. Email us at info@dobermannrescueuk.co.uk and we'll send you one.

The declaration is a really simple form, just fill in your name and address, confirm that you are a taxpayer and send it back to DRUE by post or by scanning or photographing the form and attaching it to an email. The team at DRUE will do the rest.

The magic part is that once you have completed a declaration the taxman will give DRUE an extra twenty five pence for every pound that you donate, that's extra money our volunteers can use to pay for the food, shelter, medication and comforts the Dobies in our care desperately need.

If you pay tax at the 40% higher rate, gift aid is even more generous. Not only will the taxman give DRUE an extra twenty five pence for each pound you donate, but if you tell the taxman about your gift aid donation, your tax bill will be reduced by a further twenty five pence.

You can either write to your tax office to do this or you can do it online. You can get details of your tax office from your employer or pension provider or = £1.25

from your PAYE coding notice. To be even more generous to our Dobies you might think about passing your tax saving back to DRUE as a further donation.

So, if you are a taxpayer and you want to give DRUE some extra help at no extra cost to you, please ask us for a gift aid declaration form when you make a donation, we will be only too happy to help. If you contribute to one of our special appeals through Just Giving or Go Fund Me you will find gift aid instructions on the relevant web page.

# Spotlight on our volunteer "Ben"

#### Editors note:

Once again, we have the pleasure of bringing one of our amazing volunteers from behind the scenes and into the spotlight. These dedicated individuals work tirelessly, often without recognition, to ensure DRUE's success and make a meaningful impact in our community. Today, we are thrilled to shine a light on Ben and share his inspiring story with you of his journey to DRUE and beyond.

#### My life with dogs

Ever since I can remember, our home has been filled with animals—dogs, cats, birds, rabbits, and guinea pigs. My father and grandfather were passionate about animals, but my father firmly believed that every family should have a dog. Our first dog was a German Shepherd named Kizzy. I was just a toddler then, and she would gently carry me to her kennel, becoming my first canine protector. So she was my first dog but not one I remember too well because I was just a toddler.

But the first dog I really remember was my very first Dobermann. She was an unforgettable dog named Jess.



She was a Euro and we got her as a rescue, she arrived at our home so scared and skittish, she even ran away from a ball.

We suspected she had been mistreated by her previous owners, possibly beaten with a stick as she would hide from my grandma, who used a walking stick. Jess and I grew up together, and she was incredibly intelligent, the cleverest animal we had ever had. She would fetch the post in the morning to my father's bed side in exchange for a polo mint. She loved them, she also used to speak (I say speak loosely) she would tone her voice to sound like want one. She did this when we offered treats and said what do you want.

Jess had all the typical Dobermann traits—protective, loyal, and deeply loving. Since Jess, we've had various breeds, including 4 Great Danes, 2 Dobies, 2 King Charles Spaniels, and 3 crossbreeds.

#### **Discovering DRUE**

I discovered DRUE on Facebook. My father had a soft spot for Dobermanns, he was my best pal.

I always promised I'd get another dobie however never got round to it before he passed. So it was my mission to do so, in his honour.

I contacted DRUE in May of 2021 to get a home check done and register my interest in a rescue, Dawn Wiggs and another DRUE team member came to my house and did the checks. That day Dawn became like my second Mam, as she helped me get my best pal Roxy (then Tara).





#### Volunteering at DRUE

I've always felt a strong desire to give back, especially when it comes to animals, they are something I am massively passionate about. All animals, however, dogs mainly.

A typical day at the kennels starts with greeting all the fur babies and taking them out one by one for their morning business.

Once this has been done I will then look to clean the kennels and top up waters and food. Whilst doing this I always have a natter to the other volunteers. Once the kennels are cleaned I'll spend some quality time having a little cuddle and play with the pups before heading off home.

I have taken them out for the day on adventures, trying to give them the most 'normal' experiences. The type they might expect in a loving home.




# Spotlight on our volunteer "Ben"

#### The impact of rescue work

The work done at DRUE significantly impacts the lives of the Dobermanns we help. Many come to us as a shadow of what they should be, some haven't been treated properly and they are scared, unloved, and vulnerable.

With all the work that is done, time spent and love and care given, 99% of these dogs go out as wonderful animals. I took the 1% home, her name's Rox and she's a naughty dog. But she mine.

## Advice for prospective volunteers

Do it, it's fantastic you will be getting rewarded by a smiley dog with a wagging tail and if not, they will be, once you have given them some love.

However, be prepared for the emotional challenges, as it can be hard to see some of the dogs in their initial state.

Remember, these dogs are all different but each has the same end goal, to be loved and cared for. Your time can help them achieve that.

#### **Understanding Dobermanns**

Dobermanns are sometimes misunderstood due to their portrayal in movies and media as being fierce and aggressive. In reality, they are very intelligent, very loving, and even a goofy type of daft.

They need boundaries setting, good exercise, and mental stimulation but are fantastic family dogs who will fit in well when given the right support.

#### **Personal Growth**

Well I am very open with my mental health issue's hence the reason I got a dobie and also got involved with the rescue. However, since joining the volunteering team, it's helped me.

The support and friendliness of the team, coupled with the unconditional love from the dogs, has been a great help.

These dogs have an uncanny ability to sense when we need a pick-meup cuddle or some love, making this experience truly special.

There is a saying often heard in our DRUE world "I wonder who rescued who!" I'll leave you with that thought.

Dobie mum Val, has been a dedicated Dobermann fosterer for LDR for many years, she found her perfect match in Evie on 29th July 2019.

Val had fostered numerous Dobies, but when she requested a permanent companion, Evie appeared like a dream come true.

From the first day at Val's home, a beach walk marked the beginning of Evie's reign as the queen of the coast. Her love for the beach, water, and her cherished ball was evident as she happily interacted with other dogs and people.



However, Evie now has a debilitating condition. She has been diagnosed with Masticatory Muscle Myositis (MMM), a rare immune disorder where her immune system mistakenly attacks her own muscles. This condition has progressed, leading to significant muscle swelling and pain, making it increasingly difficult for Evie to chew and eat.

#### **Understanding MMM**

Masticatory Muscle Myositis (MMM) is an autoimmune disorder affecting dogs, targeting the muscles responsible for chewing. This condition leads to muscle inflammation, swelling, and pain, significantly impacting the dog's ability to eat. As the disease advances, the muscles deteriorate, causing severe challenges in performing basic activities like chewing and swallowing.

Evie's battle with MMM underscores the importance of awareness and early intervention in managing this disease. While

her condition has limited her physical activities, the unwavering support from Val ensures that Evie continues to live with dignity and love.

# THE 3 DAYS. 3 WEEKS. 3 MONTHS RULE OF ADOPTING A RESCUE DOG

#### THIS IS A GENERAL GUIDELINE, EVERY DOG IS UNIQUE AND WILL ADJUST TO THEIR NEW ENVIRONMENT DIFFERENTLY

#### **IN THE FIRST 3 DAYS**

Overwhelmed with their new surroundings. Not comfortable enough to be themself. Reluctance to eat or drink. May shut down and curl up in their bed, crate or in a corner. May be stressed, scared and not know what is happening. May try to test you to see what they can get away with.

#### AFTER 3 WEEKS

Starting to settle in, feeling more comfortable, and realising this really may be their forever home. Figured out their environment and getting into the routine that you have set. May start showing their real personality. Behavioural issues may start showing, this is your time to put boundaries in place and show them what is right and wrong.

#### AFTER 3 MONTHS

Now completely comfortable in their home. You have built trust and a bond with your dog, which gives them a complete sense of security with you. They are set in their routine and will come to expect the routine to continue
