


## Life after rescue "Kismet and her best friend Bronson"

Dear Readers,

This month's newsletter was originally intended to celebrate the heartwarming story of Wynne's beloved Dobie, Kismet, adopted from DRUE. However, with deep sorrow we must share that between the initial writing and publication of this article, Bronson unexpectedly passed away. This sudden loss has left Wynne, her family, and indeed all of us who feel a connection through these stories, deeply saddened.

So many things I can say about my gentle giant, he was a laid back galooty handsome lad.


Very rarely left my side, he was my shadow and my soul dog.

But, Bronson was a happy, friendly lovable boy, with not a bad bone in his body (unless you were a pigeon) He was also a carer, loved my youngest grandchild and always gentle around folk.

At our meet and greet with Kismet, they ignored each other but once we got them home, Bronson made it his life's work to help Kismet adjust to her forever home. They adored each other and Kismet misses him very much.

My gorgeous boy, I will never forget you and I will love you forever. Wynne

## Not forgetting beautiful Bronson...

We follow with the story of his best buddy Kismet, as told by Wynne.

#### Kismet's arrival at DRUE

Kismet was rescued with her brother from a travellers site by DRUE. I'm not sure if she was adopted or fostered by someone for around 18 months. I believe it was then requested that Liz take Kismet back into DRUE as she had allegedly been aggressive with the lady and fought with her other two dogs in the home. Liz picked her up a skinny, scared and scarred girl.



#### Finding DRUE & Kismet

We had lost our Doberman girl the year before and we felt the time was now right for another and we agreed to adopt a rescue. I had looked online and found DRUE rescue, so we sent our application off and soon after home check was carried out. At home at the time we had Bronson our 4 year old galoot.

On the way to our DRUE meet and greet, our car stopped dead in middle of the motorway, add to the mix the fact that Bronson dislikes the car and so I was being trampled LOL. However we managed to restart the

car and we eventually made it to DRUE's Stoke kennels.

Liz brought kismet out into the enclosure and Bronson totally ignored her and she him. Half hour later after taking her for a walk - where Bronson pulled hubby into a ditch - we got back to the kennels and signed the paperwork. No way were we leaving without her.




The journey home to Newcastle (6 hours) was uneventful apart from being trampled again by Bronson! Kismet sat wide eyed in her cage and hardly moved. We arrived home and my hubby had to carry her into the house, she sat in middle of floor and didn't move for a while.



Bronson was a really good boy and didn't bother her at all, it was like he knew. At food time she guarded and

snapped at Bronson - he ignored her - was like he was telling her, it's ok, your home, nobody is ever going to hurt you again.



Kismet was not spayed when we got her and when I took her to vets she had bit of a wobble, maybe thought she was being left (no chance).



After a month she started to follow Bronson about. The rest is history, but it took a lot longer for her to be able to play, I don't think she knew how. This made me cry for this girl

but as time went by her true nature came out. Her scarred face healed up, still has couple of marks on her face and her weight is right.

Kismet and Bronson were awarded 5th place in best brace category in a recent DRUE fundraiser. She is very proud of her lovely rosette



Although we have had her a long time, I realise now she's only just played 'pully rope' properly. Now she has a basket full of toys to carry about and is happy to share.

At one point called a 'vicious dog', no way! She's a quiet girl wanting long snoozes and tummy rubs and a quiet walk/play with Bronson.



She hates her legs being touched but holds up her paw for a "Please scratch, cuddle or or wee break. She's claimed hubby as 'hers alone' and we get grumbles if chatting or when he goes out.

Having Kismet in our life helped us after losing our lovely Ruby girl. She shows so many of Ruby's traits it's amazing.



When I have spoken to other DRUE adopters they are shocked when I say 'she's no bother, total sweetheart' and one lady said 'wait, you got a quiet one' LOL! She's our beautiful princess who between her and Bronson rule our house and we wouldn't have it any other way.

Thank you DRUE for entrusting her to our care.

#### Quick fire interview — Kismet— 7 or 8 years old

**Q.** How long has she been in your life? A. She's been with us almost 6 years, as we don't know her exact birthday we celebrate each new year.

**Q. Favourite food? A.** She has no favourite food as she eats anything! She has a very sweet tooth so sweeties have to be kept out of her way!

**Q.** If she was a famous person who would she be likened to & why? A. she's a mixture of scooby doo and scrappy with a mix of Lady as in lady and the tramp. Scooby a big dog but really bit of a scared cat, scrappy thinks she can take on the world and Lady is how she is, even a bit on the flirty side when it suits her.

**Q. What makes you laugh about her? A**. If I go into hubby's 'den' I get the dirty looks, if we sit to close to each other - the evil eye LOL, however she sleeps on the bed on hubby's side and we are convinced it's because she doesn't want him near me - it's a case of 'that's my man'

**Q. Does she have a naughty side? A.** I don't think she has a naughty side, although her and Bronson would tend to 'remodel' my bedroom if I was out. And she hides hubby's clothes in her bed - particularly socks!

**Q. Best Memory or adventure:** Kismet had been with us for a month and the 2 dogs were playing nicely in our big back garden. Hubby and his brother went out of the side gate and unknown to me had not shut gate properly. I went into garden - no dogs gate wide open. We lived in a cul de sac so there was only one way they could go. To the amusement of the neighbours I'm (trying to) run up the street to the fields at the top, with just one slipper and wonder women pjs on! Got to the park, by this time shouting down phone at hubby to get back home etc. I spot Bronson and Kismet in the field with some horses. I'd only brought one lead! I called Bronson and thank goodness he came straight back. Tasked a little lad to keep eye on Kismet in middle of field while I got big lad back home. We had just got to the gate when a whirlwind Kismet galloped straight past us and home! I was never so relieved and happy!

#### **Meet Lucy**

Lucy is one of our dedicated team members, assisting with the playtime and feeds. She also plays a crucial role in communication, providing feedback about the dog's condition upon arrival and their behaviour during playtime. We chatted to her to find out more about her canine interests.

#### Animals are part of my life

I have loved animals all of my life, we always had cats and rabbits before we made the commitment of our first family dog (and my introduction to the breed) when I was 8. We had a Black and Tan Dobermann called Diva.



I fell totally head over heels for her, she was my best friend.



We used to go on amazing family adventures, which included lovely walks and holidays to Cornwall, Diva loved it. We had a cat called Pasco while we had Diva, Pasco the cat was always very much in charge as you can see from the following photo.



We then went on to have Rhodesian Ridgebacks, they are also an amazing breed. Red and Nala, we had Red from a puppy and we rescued Nala when she was 16 months old, they are going to be 9 this year.

They are both amazing dogs and loved by the whole family.





#### My current dogs

I am currently the slave to my two pride and joys Nova (Dobermann) and Jellybean (Lurcher).

Nova, aged 5. Nova is a DRUE rehome to rehome. Nova unfortunately had 2 homes before us, she is mine and Jason's first dog together and she is an absolute superstar. I knew I wanted my first dog as an adult to be a dobie, I have such fond memories from my childhood. I take part in man-trailing with Nova, she is amazing.







## Spotlight on our volunteer "Lucy"

Our plan for Nova was for her to go to doggy day care... this didn't go to plan as she hated it and would refuse to get out of the car (she is extremely stubborn) because of this I gave my full time job up and took the plunge to become a dog walker... the best thing I ever did!

One of my first clients when I started my new business was Jellybean the lurcher roughly aged 3, Jellybean had been found abandoned on the side of a motorway in Galway, Ireland.



She was rescued by the amazing Galway SPCA. Beanie was a total mess and 10kg lighter than what she is today.



She was then brought over to England to be rehomed she was placed in a foster home. I went round to meet Jellybean so I could start walking her, yet again, I fell head over heels for her, she is so sweet and just so happy with her life now.



My biggest challenge was persuading my partner that we should have a second dog... 6 weeks later Jellybean came home with us.

Nova and Jellybean are the bestest of friends and we couldn't imagine our day to day life without them.



#### Moving forward with DRUE

I have followed DRUE for quite some time, we got Nova through DRUE on rehome to rehome so DRUE then had a special place in my heart, when I became a dog walker I had some more time on my hands so I wanted to do some walks with the dobies. I now see to the dogs 5 mornings a week.

#### A typical day at DRUE

I head over to the kennels between 7am/8am in the morning, I get each dog out and spend some time with them in the paddock, we play games, do some training and play snifaris.



Once all the dogs have been out in the morning I will take them back to the kennels, make sure it is all clean and feed them.

#### The challenges I find

The biggest challenge I personally face daily is putting them back in their kennel, I just feel every dog should have a loving home and it breaks my heart.

#### Dog behaviour and handling

Slow and steady wins the race, I always befriend the dogs by giving them a good treat, I then open the kennel door and give them lots of love

#### **Memorable Dobie moments**

Rupert, he is the most amazing boy however, he was challenging at times. Rupert was just a big puppy who hadn't had any boundaries put in place, I had some mornings with him and he would be amazing and others where he would really test me.



Rupert got adopted but then unfortunately came back and I was so sad for him, the team finally got him a foster home and the rest is history. He has been adopted. I am just over the moon for him. He is a really special boy.

#### The impact of rescue

The work done by DRUE has a profound impact on the lives of Dobermanns in need. By offering them a safe refuge, medical care, and often training, DRUE provides these dogs with the chance to thrive in loving, permanent homes.

Many Dobermanns rescued from the dog warden or abusive situations may have experienced neglect, trauma, or inadequate care, and the work done by DRUE helps them heal both physically and emotionally. This not only transforms their lives, but also allows the new owners to experience the joy of bringing a loyal and loving companion into their lives. Ultimately, the impact is a cycle of positive change: the dog gets a second chance, and the owners gain a devoted friend.



## Advice for prospective volunteers/team members If you're considering volunteering at

DRUE, as a helper or dog walker, here are a few key pieces of advice...

Patience is key: Dogs in rescue often come from difficult situations, and some may take time to trust people again. Be patient and understanding as they adjust.

Learn the breed and behaviour:
Understanding the specific needs and behaviour of the dogs you're working with, especially breeds like
Dobermanns, can help you connect with them more effectively. Knowing their temperament and energy levels will also guide how you interact with them.

Positive attitude: Your energy and attitude can have a big impact on the dogs. Be calm, confident, and kind.

They pick up on your vibes and respond accordingly.



Build relationships: Beyond walks, take the time to bond with the dogs. Play with them, offer treats, and simply spend time getting to know them. The emotional connection is just as important as physical care.



Ask questions: Don't hesitate to ask for guidance from experienced team members. It's a learning experience, and the more you understand the needs of each dog, the better your impact will be.

Have realistic expectations: Rescue work can be tough, and not every dog will be adopted quickly. Some may face ongoing health or behavioural challenges, but your effort will still make a difference in their lives.

Enjoy the experience: Above all, remember that volunteering can be incredibly rewarding. It's not just about helping dogs, it's about being part of a community that truly makes a difference in their lives.




#### **Understanding Dobermanns**

I wish more people understood that Dobermanns are incredibly loyal, intelligent, and sensitive dogs. While they often have a reputation for being tough or intimidating, they're actually very affectionate and form deep bonds with their families. Here are some things I'd want people to know...

They need strong leadership:
Dobermanns thrive when they have
a confident, consistent leader. At
DRUE, many of them may have
come from environments where
they lacked structure or guidance.
With proper training, they can be
incredibly well-behaved and loyal
companions.

Sensitive souls: Despite their tough exterior, Dobermanns are often very sensitive dogs. They can become easily stressed by harsh training methods or being in chaotic environments. They need gentle, positive reinforcement to build their confidence and feel secure.



High energy and intelligence:
Dobermanns are very active and smart. They need plenty of physical exercise and mental stimulation to stay happy and healthy. If they don't get enough of both, they can become bored or anxious, which may lead to undesirable behaviours.

They crave attention and affection:
Dobermanns are known for being
"velcro dogs" because they love being
close to their people. The DRUE
dogs, particularly those who have
been abandoned or mistreated, may
become more attached to humans
once they feel safe. They thrive on
companionship and do not like being
left alone for long periods.

Adaptable but need time to adjust: While Dobermanns are adaptable and can fit into various living situations, they often need time to adjust to their new surroundings.

In short, Dobermanns from DRUE often just need the right environment and understanding to truly shine.

They're not "guard dogs"—they're loving, loyal companions that can make fantastic pets when given the chance.



#### Personal growth

Working with DRUE has brought a profound personal impact. It has heighten my empathy and compassion, deepening my connection with animals and their well-being.

My experience with DRUE has shifted my perspective on welfare issues, making me more aware of the broader systemic challenges in animal care, like overpopulation, neglect, and the need for stricter regulations.

If you've followed our Social Media you will have seen the heartbreaking story of Toby. A story that brought a lot of our team and many of our supporters to tears. So I thought it would be nice to let our brave super hero tell his own story.

#### Woof!

I'm Toby, a Dobermann with a tale to tell—well, three legs and a tale, if we're being exact. Life's been a wild ride so far, and I'm only seven months old. Let me take you back to where it all started going sideways.

It was a blurry day, early March they say—when my old human decided I wasn't worth keeping. I'd jumped out of his car window, chasing a squirrel or maybe just the wind, I forget now. As I landed, crack, my back leg broke very badly.

#### I was in so much pain





The angel keeps a good eye on me though 'cause I get quite excited sometimes and want to run-hop all over the place. That's because I'm so happy now.

I get lots of nice food now but eating's a messy business and so I get food all over the place and all over my nose, but the humans laugh about it.





The humans say that all of the vet visits and treatments, my new toys, and the

chews, all come from extremely kind people who sent money to help me. I these people are so kind, I'm very grateful, so thank you.

# THE 3 DAYS. 3 WEEKS. 3 MONTHS RULE OF ADOPTING A RESCUE DOG

THIS IS A GENERAL GUIDELINE, EVERY DOG IS UNIQUE AND WILL ADJUST TO THEIR NEW ENVIRONMENT DIFFERENTLY

#### IN THE FIRST 3 DAYS

Overwhelmed with their new surroundings. Not comfortable enough to be themself.

Reluctance to eat or drink. May shut down and curl up in their bed, crate or in a corner. May be stressed, scared and not know what is happening. May try to test you to see what they can get away with.

#### AFTER 3 WEEKS

Starting to settle in, feeling more comfortable, and realising this really may be their forever home. Figured out their environment and getting into the routine that you have set. May start showing their real personality. Behavioural issues may start showing, this is your time to put boundaries in place and show them what is right and wrong.

#### AFTER 3 MONTHS

Now completely comfortable in their home. You have built trust and a bond with your dog, which gives them a complete sense of security with you. They are set in their routine and will come to expect the routine to continue
