We are looking for more local volunteers who can help us get the dogs out walking or on adventures as much as possible, see more info on page 9.




Dogs who found their new forever home

Life after rescue — “Dotty”

Editor’s note: My personal connection to Dotty:

This month, we’re sharing the story of a rescue dog named Dotty, who became incredibly special to me and also to many of our team members at DRUE.

Dotty arrived at our Rescue in November 2022, alongside another stray named Maggie. Found wandering together, we suspected they might be related, perhaps mother and daughter? Though we could not be sure.



Over the next few months, we got to know both dogs well. Maggie, the luckier of the two, was soon adopted by a wonderful lady Ruth, who later joined our volunteer team. It was a joy to hear updates about Maggie settling into her new home. But for Dotty, the days stretched into months, and months turned into over a year. She remained with us, waiting.

I grew deeply attached to Dotty, as did several others on our team. My heart melted every time I saw her sweet face or watched her hop excitedly on her back legs at the kennel bars, knowing it was time for a walk. She was the rescue dog who truly stole my heart.



Taking her out became the highlight of my visits to DRUE. We’d wander down quiet lanes, roam through fields, or play in the secure paddock.

I’ll never forget one hot summer day when we lay together in the long grass, basking in the warm sun. She lay relaxed and content beside me as I stroked her, admiring her quirky ears, one standing tall and pointed, the other flopping down. I adored those ears.

Time seemed to slow in those moments, and I could have stayed there forever.



Dotty had a reactive side, barking at dogs, cars, cyclists, and horses, in fact pretty much anything that wasn’t human. Yet beneath that, she had a loving, affectionate nature, soaking up attention from anyone willing to give it. It broke my heart to see her still with us as another year began, her forever home seeming like a distant dream.

Our dream came true

Then, something wonderful happened. A wonderful lady named Caroline took an interest in Dotty. After a few meetings, the day we’d all hoped for arrived: Dotty went home with Caroline.



A group of our volunteers gathered to wave her off, and there were plenty of happy tears that day. Our team member Ruth bought Dotty a teddy, which she proudly carried in her mouth throughout the goodbyes. Our dream for her had come true, though we’d miss her dearly.

Dotty has settled into my home remarkably well. For a reactive dog, she's surprised me by getting along beautifully with my daughter's Dobermann and adapting to meeting new people.

She has her favourite toys and a cozy blanket, she loves nothing more than curling up and snuggling on the couch with her favourite blanket.



Dotty's brought so much laughter and love into my life. She's a character, a companion, and a constant reminder of the joy that rescue dogs can bring.



She has a wonderful life now and goes on countless walks, she claimed her own spot on the sofa, and despite having her own bed, she prefers snuggling up in mine with me.



Dotty's personality shines through every day. She makes me laugh when she races up and down the stairs after my son's food, boldly kicking his door open.



If she doesn't get her way, she throws little tantrums, jumping up and down, hopping on her back legs like a kangaroo.

She's been known to steal a jar of coconut oil and pry it open, and she guards the cooker like a sentinel whenever I'm cooking food.


Then I helped Debbie out on the Tombola



Dobermanns; their use as war dogs

Dobermanns - War dogs

The 80th year Anniversary of VE day approaches on 8th May 2025, and as we honour the brave soldiers and remember the hardships, let us also spare a moment to reflect on the animals that bravely played a role and fought in World War II, and in our case particularly, the Dobermanns!

I'm sure many of you are already aware that Dobermanns amongst other breeds served in both World War I and World War II for our own British Royal Army Veterinary Corps, but also the German Army and our Allied Forces in which they proved themselves to be a versatile and valuable asset being utilised in various roles.

Duties

They were renowned for their INTELLIGENCE as easily trainable, their AGILITY allowing them to navigate various terrain undetected and their GUARDING ABILITY perfectly fulfilling the role of sentry duties.

More notable tasks performed by Dobermanns in the War efforts included:-

Sentry and Guarding Duties - They were trained to work with guards, providing warning for any potential threat, protecting important installations and personnel and safeguard command posts.

Messenger Roles - Trained for carrying messages between units, leveraging their speed and agility, they followed scent trails between their field handler to a handler at the headquarter destination and when released with a message the dog would return to the field handler by memory, successfully within a distance of up to eight miles.

Scouting/Patrolling/Tracking - They were used for reconnaissance and trained to detect enemy presence and alert handlers, taking advantage of their keen senses they were also trained to track enemy personnel.

Training

Dog training comprised of special six to eight week programmes for the simpler sentry dogs, but for those performing more specialised tasks and missions, the training could last up to 12 weeks.

Dogs began testing from six months old and many thousands of families offered up their family dogs to be trained by the military for the war effort.

On early examination and training, the weeding out process began - It required the dog recruit to follow his handler day and/or night across various terrain, to behave properly climbing stairs and entering darkened rooms, crossing ditches and streams and hearing gunfire and more. Timid dogs were instantly eliminated from the programme.

The dog handlers were also specially selected and their prerequisite following satisfactory basic military training were to be friendly and sympathetic to dogs; as they sensed

handlers who were not, and their willingness to perform greatly diminished.

Whilst different dog breeds excelled in different roles in the war effort, and Dobermanns were used extensively in World War I, the British Royal Army and German Army slowly began to sway their favour towards Alsatian/German Shepherds in World War II, but the Dobermann Pinscher, nicknamed Devil Dogs following on from World War I still appeared to be the hands-down favourite of the United States Marine Corps.

Summary

Dobermanns proved time and time again that they were courageous, dominant, confident and a fearless dog breed and as such became one of the most respected breeds for military work at that time.

So as we honour our WWII veterans, with so few of them remaining now, on this auspicious day marking the 80th Anniversary for Victory in Europe, please take a moment to remember our four-legged friends whose ancestors fought gallantly alongside these brave soldiers becoming heroes without medals in their own rights and helping to save countless human lives.

AND WILL ADJUST TO THEIR NEW ENVIRONMENT DIFFERENTLY**

IN THE FIRST 3 DAYS

Overwhelmed with their new surroundings. Not comfortable enough to be themselves. Reluctance to eat or drink. May shut down and curl up in their bed, crate or in a corner. May be stressed, scared and not know what is happening. May try to test you to see what they can get away with.

AFTER 3 WEEKS

Starting to settle in, feeling more comfortable, and realising this really may be their forever home. Figured out their environment and getting into the routine that you have set. May start showing their real personality. Behavioural issues may start showing, this is your time to put boundaries in place and show them what is right and wrong.

AFTER 3 MONTHS

Now completely comfortable in their home. You have built trust and a bond with your dog, which gives them a complete sense of security with you. They are set in their routine and will come to expect the routine to continue
