
DRUE LIFE

Meet beautiful Cece




A true food Diva

She's the cutest, cuddliest & funniest loon I've had the pleasure to be owned by! She loves a dummy (yes you read that right!).




She also has a habit of having a cheeky little root through the flowers until she gets to the pear tree and steals one!

Intro to our dynamic duo
Vicky and Paul have been
regular volunteers since October
2024. Between them, they have
shared their lives not only with
dogs but with a wide variety of
animals, including cats, guinea
pigs, hamsters, rabbits, mice,
budgies, canaries, doves,
chickens, fish and even more
exotic companions such as
tortoises, tarantulas, and a
particularly charismatic
chameleon named Fred.

Many of these animals came into their care through rescue or rehoming situations, each one leaving a lasting impression on their hearts, but nothing quite captures the heart like a Dobermann.

Our life with Dobermanns

I often shared fond memories with Paul of my beloved rescue Dobermann, Higgins. That was Paul's first real insight into the Dobermann breed and their unique, endearing character.



I grew up in South Africa, where Higgins was discovered by a rescue shelter in a heartbreaking state - emaciated, tied up outside an abandoned property with no access to shelter, food, or water.

Higgins was estimated to be around two years old when he joined our family and had clearly spent his entire life outside, likely used solely as a guard dog. This difficult start brought many challenges. He was undersocialised, reactive to other dogs, and deeply mistrustful of strangers. Given his past, he had every reason to be wary of the world, and it was up to us to meet him with patience, empathy, and understanding. With time, love, and consistent care, Higgins gradually blossomed into the most wonderful, loyal companion.

He was a true Dobermann: highly intelligent, fiercely loyal and protective, yet bursting with character and fun. Higgins left an indelible mark on my heart and is the very reason Paul and I eventually chose to welcome our own Dobermann, Rocco, into our lives.

Rocco joined us as an 8-weekold, lovable, cheeky puppy and quickly became our whole world.

He was involved in every aspect of our lives. Our constant companion, from extended family





gatherings to fun-filled annual holidays. As a result, Rocco grew into a confident dog who took everything in his stride, and he absolutely loved life.

With a heart of pure devotion and as big as his personality, his love and affection knew no bounds. He was well known in our local community and had a way of captivating everyone he met, especially children, and thrived on their energy and enthusiasm.



Rocco had a remarkable ability to adapt his behaviour to suit the dogs around him - calm and playful with puppies, and offering a gentle, reassuring presence to more nervous or anxious dogs.

Through him, we deepened our understanding of canine



communication, learning how dogs interact, set boundaries, and support one another in ways that are often far more intuitive and sensitive than we realise.



Tragically, Rocco was diagnosed with Lymphoma in August 2024. We chose to pursue chemotherapy, but sadly he stopped responding to treatment. He passed away peacefully in our arms in October, just shy of his ninth birthday.



We loved him dearly and miss him terribly but in honour of our gorgeous boy, and having supported and followed DRUE for many years, we made a promise to Rocco: that we would do everything we could to help his breed and the dogs in need. And so, we became volunteers at DRUE, continuing his legacy with love.

Our DRUE journey

Since becoming volunteers, we have witnessed with heavy hearts many dogs come into DRUE's care. From owners who have tragically passed away and reluctant surrenders, to unwanted or abandoned dogs, with little to no known history. Some arrive having experienced abuse, neglect, or inadequate care.



With every dog, we have learned that a slow and gentle approach is always best. Patience

compassion are essential and tasty treats go a long way. It's admirable how incredibly resilient and forgiving these dogs can be. With time, love, and consistency, they begin to adapt, trust, and open their hearts.

Spending meaningful time with them - whether walking, training, playing, grooming, or simply sharing a quiet cuddle on the office sofa forms a bond that is



deeply rewarding for both the dogs and their carers.

Volunteering comes with its challenges. From behavioural issues to lead



pulling, there can be hurdles to overcome.

For us, it is the emotional challenges that can be the hardest to bear. Over time, you learn to build a certain level of resilience and develop ways to manage the emotional strain, but it never becomes truly easy. Even the little things, like returning a dog to their kennel after a long, wonderful day spent in their company can be heartbreaking.



Losing Xena recently was especially difficult for all of us at DRUE. She captured both Paul's heart and mine instantly. Such a sweet girl with the most beautiful, gentle soul. Her loss hit us hard, and many tears were shed. Yet we feel truly honoured to have shared such a profound connection with her. Xena left a lasting impression, and she will forever live on in all our hearts and memories.



Our DRUE Foster, Lulu

Thankfully, the rewards far outweigh the emotional toll. A particularly rewarding time for us was fostering Lulu, who had been in kennels elsewhere for two years, before coming to DRUE.



She was struggling with her mobility (which later materialised to be Osteochondritis Dissecans, a progressive condition that she will have for the rest of her life) and was in poor physical condition with skin issues and bearing deep scars.

She was nervous, anxious and confused, so over the course of



three weeks, we allowed her time to decompress and focused on ensuring she felt safe and secure, slowly gaining her trust.

Everything about a home environment was completely new and overwhelming for her. She was introduced gradually to everyday things most of us take for granted like the washing machine, the vacuum cleaner, and even the TV - all of which initially frightened her. With patience and encouragement, she began to relax.

Eventually, she started to ignore those once scary noises and distractions and to our surprise, she even developed a fascination with her nemesis, the TV. She was absolutely mesmerised by

the snooker, happily watching the balls move across the screen with intense concentration.



Lulu had not experienced much of the outside world, either. Thankfully, she absolutely adored car journeys, so we used that to our advantage. Taking her on some wonderful road trips where she could discover new sights, sounds, and smells.





She visited an expansive beach on the Wirral Peninsula and felt the sand beneath her paws for the very first time, was treated like "Princess Lulu" during a visit



to Hawarden Castle in Wales, sniffed the bluebells and quietly watched deer roam at Dunham Massey.

She enjoyed a leisurely stroll along the parade at Parkgate, taking in the vast array of birdlife on the estuary while happily lapping up one of their famous ice creams. She even explored the historic city of Chester, following ducks and swans along the River Dee with curious delight.





As her confidence grew, so did her experiences. We visited garden centres, pet stores, enjoyed breakfast alfresco at quaint cafés and after a day exploring, we would all relax with a cool drink, soaking up the last of the sunshine at a welcoming, dog friendly pub.



To witness her true personality slowly emerge and to watch her adapt, recover and thrive despite the traumas she had endured,

was inspiring and truly humbling. To have played even a small part in her journey was an incredible privilege and we are both immensely proud of Lulu and all that she achieved in a relatively short period of time.

When the moment came to wave

her off to her forever home in Cornwall, it was bittersweet, but we are so grateful to be in contact with her wonderful mum.

Watching Lulu blossom continues to bring us immense joy. It is always heartwarming to receive updates on the dogs DRUE have rehomed and how they continue to flourish in their new lives, beyond our care.



We will forever treasure our memories with this special girl, who came to realise that kindness does exist, and that the world is not something to fear, but something to be explored and enjoyed.

Moments like these are what make every challenge, every tear, completely and utterly worth it.



corner. May be stressed, scared and not know what is happening. May try to test you
to see what they can get away with.

AFTER 3 WEEKS

Starting to settle in, feeling more comfortable, and realising this really may be their forever home. They're figuring out their environment and getting into the routine that you have set. Now they may start showing their real personality. Behavioural issues may start showing, this is your time to ensure boundaries are in place and you show them what is right and wrong.

AFTER 3 MONTHS

Now completely comfortable in their home. You have built trust and a bond with your dog, which gives them a complete sense of security with you. They are set in their routine and will come to expect the routine to continue
