



This month we hear about the lovely Rocco who was adopted by Liz and their journey together so far. Over to Liz to tell her story...

Hearing about DRUE

I had heard about DRUE via a friend who is a volunteer walker there. We had lost our staffy Stanley in Sept 23 and I, in particular, was completely heartbroken. It took me a while to feel ready to take on another doggy.

I started volunteer dog walking at Pawprints to Freedom in Nantwich from Jan 24 as I missed a doggy companion so much, but wasn't sure about taking the plunge with another.

Then around Sept 24 we started looking at different rescues and what really caught our attention with DRUE was the detailed write up for each dog. We initially went to meet another dog at DRUE Rupert, but he was a little nippy at the time and seemed a bit too much for us. We therefore took



Rocco out for a walk instead and he was so lovely right from the start.

Mark had a few more visits, one with his dad where they went for a coffee with Rocco. We then made the decision to adopt him and took him home on 3 Oct 24.



Settling our new boy in

From day 1 he settled so well with us. I booked a few days off work so I could concentrate on settling him, and he was just so good.

He settled straight away over night in his bed in the kitchen/dining room.




To this day going to bed is so easy. He knows exactly what we mean when we go out to garden and ask him to 'toilet' he then comes trotting back inside and straight into his bed waiting for a little treat, and then we don't hear a peep out of him until morning.

We didn't know an exact DOB but we were told he was around 3 when we adopted him. We therefore gave him the day we

took him home as his birthday, so he will be 4 years old on 3 Oct 25, when we will have had him 1 year.



Looking back, he was quiet in those first few days/weeks. He did exactly what we asked of him but in quite a robotic way and his tail didn't wag too much.



Over the months he has really come out of his shell and started to show his cheeky little personality.

He loves his food (any food, he isn't at all fussy!). Its the first thing he asks for in the morning and we can't get many mins past 5pm before he is asking for his tea! He definitely can tell the

time! He will pinch food off the worktop given half a chance, and has had a few pastries over the months.



He loves his walks and adores a romp off lead. The first few weeks we had him on a long line and took him to secure dog parks. I now can trust him off lead. His recall on the whole is pretty good but he does like to bounce over to other dogs in a very friendly way, but I try to not let him do that if possible as he does like to pinch other dogs balls, and not give them back! In a very friendly way, but again I try and avoid that if we possibly can.

He really loves a stick, the bigger the better, as you will see in a



couple of the pics! He also loves a splash around in water.

We often walk him along a local stream where he

loves to dart off into the water and splash around. He won't go out of his depth at moment though.



We have had a number of trips to the beach in North Wales, which he adored.

We have also had a week in Angelsey and taken him away in our campervan for a few days in the Lakes.



He rode on the Steamer on Ullswater for 2x1 hour trips and took it all in his stride. Lots of people came over to pet him and he was so well behaved.



Things that make us laugh - he does a little bucking bronco dance when we give him a pigs ear or big chew in the evening, where he throws it around for a few mins before eating it. He also gives these sneaky little kissy licks, he seems to like making me laugh when he does that.

He is very sociable with people and other dogs, small and large. He likes a race around if the other dog is up for it, but equally is happy to have a little sniff and walk on.



I run regularly and after around 1 month I started doing a few short runs with him. I am a regular at our local parkrun in Crewe and I then started taking

him and just walking the course to start with and worked up to running it. He has now done a total of 16 parkruns. He seems to enjoy it and when we get home he usually has a bit of a zoomie round the house, which I think is him releasing a bit of energy which he has stored up by having to run nicely next to me.



We did parkrun on Christmas Day 2024 when I went as an Elf and Rocco as Santa!



We couldn't now imagine life without Rocco and I can safely say after losing our Stan, he has brought so much joy back to our lives and is helping to heal my heart one little stolen lick/kiss at a time!

Spotlight on our volunteer Paul

Ed's note:

This month, we're thrilled to spotlight Paul, one of our dedicated volunteers who travels countless miles to join us regularly at DRUE. The unwavering commitment from our volunteers never ceases to amaze us, as they pour love, care, and energy into enriching the lives of our rescue dogs. Join us as we dive into Paul's inspiring story and discover what drew him to volunteer with DRUE.

Over to Paul

Samba was my first experience with a Doberman back in the 70's as a child where I was brought up in a village called Silkstone Common (where I still live). It lies between the towns of Barnsley and Penistone at the foothills of the Pennines.

Samba lived at Nortons racing stables just down the road from the post office where we lived, at a time when the Black Panther was doing his rounds, shooting sub-postmasters for their takings.

In the 70's there was hardly any cars on the road in the Common so dogs would roam freely, including Samba. At the first sight of Samba, we all used to run away as fast as we



could, with Samba in hot pursuit, as we were convinced, he was going to eat us for his dinner!

After spending what seemed like hours on top of the climbing frame in the rec with a crazy Doberman barking away at us, someone's parent would eventually come along and shoo him away. Realising years later with Dobie experience that Samba just wanted to play with us, I think!



At the time we had a family dog called Lassie like the one on the TV and a cat called Bluey who both used to come on my paper round with me.



As Lassie grew old her eyes began to fade and one day after returning home from school and realising that she wasn't there my dad told me that he'd taken her to the vets to be put to sleep and had left her there! The first and only time I've swung for my dad, I was twelve! That was my first taste of heartbreak. God, I loved that dog!

I started working for Yorkshire Electricity at 19 and left home at 21. For the next 15 years all I

seemed to do was work and go out socialising.

Then in my mid 30s I got a call out of the blue from my ex-girlfriend who had a Doberman called Buster who she could no longer look after. She asked if I wanted him and if not, he would be going to the rescue.



I had really taken to Buster during our time together so I thought I would give it a go. This was the start of 25 years of juggling work and having a Doberman.

I used to come home from nightclubbing at 2 am to be greeted by the biggest smile and whitest teeth. I remember thinking at the time if only I could find a girlfriend who would greet me like that at this time in the morning.

I had Buster until he was nine and a half when DCM forced me to have him put to sleep. Heartbreak again, God I loved that dog!

At the time I never thought that I would be able to witness the procedure, but I am glad I did as we always did everything together, so I felt I had to be with him until the very end.

Next came Sol. He had been rescued by Yvonne Cox and Darren Young of Zeloviak Dobermanns in Great Wyrley, Walsall.



Sol was one year old when I adopted him. I used to love that people who thought that Dobermanns were scary and vicious would get over their fear by stroking and talking to Sol who was a typical, loveable Dobe. He lived to ten and a half. This time Lymphoma was the cause of him being put to sleep. Bloody heart break again and boy did I love that dog.

It was at this point that I started to notice the rescues online. Chris Omar was the lady who I dealt with for Nala who worked for the Dobermann rescue in Guildford Surrey.

It was through this rescue that I adopted Nala who was 7 months old. Her previous owner was Greek who had imported her over from Zante, so all her commands were in Greek. Back

then she was the only Dobe in Barnsley who understood the Greek language!



Four years ago, I met Janet. Nala helped her to overcome her fear of big dogs. Janet helped to introduce Nala to the beautiful beaches of the Northeast coast as this is where Janet had been brought up. Nala was nearly 12 when due to her back legs no longer being able to support her, I made that agonising decision of having her put to sleep. Is there anything worse than this in life. I really did love that dog.

I have been following certain rescues online for a few years now and I have always been impressed by the rescue, rehabilitation and rehoming of the dogs. The story that really got me interested was about Phoenix who was a rescue from Cyprus.



Fortunately, I got to meet her at DRUE's Pawfest in August 24 (she was in a beach girl swim suit fancy dress) and spoke to her owner Hayley about getting involved at the rescue. I also recall speaking to Lucy who had Louis with her and having a very long conversation with who I think must have been Jannine on the Tombola Stall!

So, after losing Nala in February 25, I started volunteering at DRUE in March, making visits twice a month either for the day or sometimes staying over at Bridge Farm with Helen and Richard (I would highly recommend).



On our first visit we had the pleasure of hearing Toby's story, the tri paw Dobermann and saw how well he was making amazing progress after only a few days after his amputation.

I am planning on retiring next year which would be a good time to get another Doberman, but would that mean less time at the rescue.

I do wonder quite often as to whether I am letting some rescue Dobes pass me by but now is not the right time. Maybe fostering may be the way forward for me, or was Brando trying to tell me something a few weeks ago (*see photo*) when I opened the boot of my sports car and he jumped in!

I always thought that rescues were places where the dogs were kennelled 24/7 and hardly exercised. Just sitting and waiting for a new owner to appear but DRUE is far from that. Walks, secure fields, paddock time, cuddles in the office and even taken to people's homes for half or full days.

This all keeps the dogs interested and stimulated and very visible differences occur in the dogs in a very short period as they are shown so much love. All done by the kennel maids (not sure of their official title) and volunteers, some who travel a fair distance and others who have an hour to spare between other commitments.

The lengths that the team go to always amaze me, for example, ferrying dogs to the rescue at any time of day and always making sure that there is someone there for the pups. They all come together to help look after the dogs and get them ready for a new home/

owner. There are plenty who I haven't met yet including the administrators, fund raisers and donators. All for their love of Dobermanns.

The team always make you feel very welcome at the farm including Ann and Ian and their family who provide the space for the kennels at the farm. I love meeting the new Dobes and spending time with them, but the

best and strangely sad part is seeing them jumping into their new owner's car and on their way to their new life. I wish we got to see more updates on the adopted ones, but I understand why not.




I doubt whether a Samba will come into the rescue but if a Sam ever does watch this space.

Our heart's heroes...Dobies



World Heart Day, 29th Sept

At DRUE on World Heart Day, we will pause to celebrate the incredible bond we share with Dobermanns, both the rescues that we develop a bond with even though it's for a short time, and our own Dobies (and other breeds) back home.

Our Dobies capture our love and make our hearts so happy, when we lose them our heart breaks.

These loyal, intelligent, and brave dogs carve a permanent place in our hearts and lives, becoming more than pets; they are family.

For many of us, adopting a rescue Dobermann brings a unique kind of healing. Some adopters say that rather than saving their dog, it's the dog who saves them, offering dependable friendship, love, and purpose.

On this World Heart Day, let's look at two extraordinary examples from history where Dobermanns heroically saved human lives, proving their devotion knows no bounds.

Khan

In 2007, a Dobermann named Khan became a global symbol of bravery in Australia.

When a deadly King Brown snake, one of the world's most venomous, targeted a baby girl, Khan sprang into action. With lightning-fast instincts, he grabbed the child by her diaper, flung her to safety, and took a venomous bite to his paw in her place.



Khan's selfless act saved the girl's life, and though he nearly succumbed to the venom, he survived, earning worldwide admiration. This story shows the protective instincts that make Dobermanns such devoted guardians.

Kurt

Another heroic Dobermann, Kurt, left an indelible mark during World War II. Serving as a scout dog during the Battle of Guam, Kurt's keen senses detected approaching Japanese soldiers, alerting a group of 250 Marines to a potential ambush.

His early warning allowed the Marines to prepare, saving their lives.

Tragically, Kurt was killed in action, but his sacrifice is immortalised in a memorial statue on Guam, a testament to

his courage and the Dobermann's unyielding loyalty.



These stories remind us why Dobermanns hold such a special place in our hearts. Whether they're protecting us from danger, offering companionship through tough times, or simply curling up beside us, these dogs give us their all.

At DRUE we see this magic every day in the rescue Dobies who find their forever homes. For many adopters, these dogs become lifelines, filling their lives with love and purpose.

This World Heart Day, let's celebrate the Dobermanns who make our hearts beat stronger. Consider supporting our rescue to give more of these incredible dogs a second chance. Introducing Waggy Races

Meet Becki from Waggy Races; Pawfest sponsor and champion for misunderstood dogs.

We're thrilled to spotlight Becki, the passionate force behind Waggy Races Dog Walking & Training, who has generously sponsored our upcoming Pawfest event on September 6, 2025.

As a dedicated advocate for large breeds like Dobermanns, Becki's journey aligns perfectly with DRUE's mission to rescue, and rehome Dobermanns in need.

Her expertise in behaviour and training has helped countless dogs and owners, preventing unnecessary euthanasia and fostering understanding of these often-misunderstood "goofy giants."

Let's dive into Becki's inspiring story. Becki's love for animals began on a rural steading in

Scotland, where she grew up surrounded by dogs, horses, rabbits, goats, and more. This early immersion sparked a lifelong passion, leading her to pursue an HNC in Animal Care at agricultural college.

She then gained hands-on experience in a dog daycare, working with diverse breeds and addressing various behaviour challenges under the guidance of an experienced trainer.

Becki further honed her skills through seminars and worked as a veterinary nurse while completing her honours degree in Animal Biology.

A pivotal moment came during her vet nursing days when she witnessed young puppies—including two Staffordshire Bull Terrier pups under five months old, being euthanised due to mislabelled "aggression" that was simply misunderstood behaviour.

Heartbroken and determined to

make a change, Becki pursued advanced studies, earning her Diploma in Companion Animal Behaviour and Training (DipCABT) from COAPE in 2020.

She's also qualified in animal nutrition, canine first aid, body language, and as a Scentwork UK instructor.

This expertise propelled her to collaborate with dog trainers and rescues, ultimately leaving her veterinary role in 2018 to focus on dog training full-time.

In 2015, Becki launched Waggy Races, specialising in large-breed reactive dogs.

Her early fosters included a Great Dane and a Dogue de Bordeaux, both initially reactive to dogs and humans, but through her patient methods, they transformed into confident travellers and even "stooge dogs" for training classes.

Today, Becki leads a talented team—three of whom are Dobermann owners themselves—who handle dog walking services, while she dedicates herself to full-time training.

Her offerings span pet obedience, behaviour modification (tackling issues like dog or human aggression and resource guarding), and sport dog training for disciplines like Schutzhund. She also runs a shadow programme, mentoring aspiring trainers by allowing them to observe her sessions and guide their own consultations.

Dobermanns hold a special place in Becki's heart. Her entry into the breed came via a Dobermann cross foster, followed by several more fosters. In 2019, she welcomed her own Dobermann, Enzo, but tragically lost him at just two years old to a rapid lymphoma diagnosis, mere weeks after qualifying for Crufts. This devastating loss rallied the Dobermann community around

her, earning Becki the affectionate title of "the crazy Dobermann lady" in her local area.

Undeterred, she continued her involvement in Schutzhund as a helper and now shares her home with three-year-old Zorro. Together, they've earned a BH title, qualified for Crufts, and serve as stooge dogs in training sessions. This year, they're trialling for Zorro's IGP1 title, showcasing Becki's commitment to the breed's potential.

Through Waggy Races, based in Livingston, Becki aims to educate owners around the UK on the quirks of large, energetic breeds, especially those boisterous adolescent male Dobs we all know and love! By shedding light on proper behaviour understanding and training, she



provides hope and prevents heartbreak. Her sponsorship of Pawfest not only supports DRUE's vital work but also highlights her shared goal: ensuring every Dobermann gets a fair chance at a happy, forever home.
